Four days before the wedding, Egeus came to see Theseus with his daughter Hermia and two young men called Demetrius and Lysander. Egeus had a problem. Demetrius wanted to marry Hermia. He liked Demetrius and had given him his permission to marry her. The problem was that Hermia did not want to marry Demetrius. She was in love with Lysander and wanted to marry him instead. Lysander loved Hermia and wanted Egeus to give him permission to marry Hermia.

Theseus, however, said that girls should not decide whom they would marry. Their fathers should make this decision. He agreed with Egeus. He told Hermia that she should obey her father and marry Demetrius. He told her that if she did not, she would die, or they would put her in a **convent** where she could never marry.

Theseus, Lysander, Demetrius, Hyppolyta, Hermia, and Helena are sitting on chairs ready to watch a play. Quince enters.

Quince: The play is ready to begin. It is probably not very good,

but we hope you like it anyway. It is a short, boring, sad comedy. The actors are ready. They are not very

good actors, but they will do their best. Enjoy!

Theseus: This is nonsense. How can it be sad and a comedy?

How can it be short and boring?

Lysander: It is like black snow or hot ice.

Hermia: How can we enjoy something that is not very good?

Theseus: Let's see what happens next.

Quince: Here are the actors!

Bottom, Flute, Snout, Starveling, and Snug come onto the stage.

Quince: The story is about a man called Pyramus, (Bottom

puts up his hand) who loves a beautiful lady called Thisbe (Flute puts up his hand). They meet near a wall (Snout puts up his hand) and agree to meet in the moonlight (Starveling puts up his hand). When Thisbe arrives, a lion (Snug puts up his hand) chases her

away. She drops her coat, and the lion tears it. When Pyramus finds it, he thinks that the lion has killed Thisbe. He is sad and kills himself. Thisbe comes back and finds him dead. She kills herself, too.

Quince, Bottom, Flute, Starveling, and Snug all leave the stage.

Helena: It sounds very sad. Hermia: It sounds very funny. Demetrius: It sounds boring. Hippolyta: I hope it is short!

Theseus: It sounds like a short, boring, sad comedy!

Snout: My name is Snout. I am the wall. The wall has a small

hole in it. (He puts his thumbs and forefingers together to make a small hole.) The lovers often whisper

through this hole.

Theseus: I have never heard a wall speak so well!

The other spectators all agree, nodding their heads and saying "Yes," or "That's right," or "Neither have I." Bottom enters the stage.

Theseus: Look, here comes Pyramus. Let's listen!

Bottom: What a dark night this is! I hope Thisbe has not

forgotten me. Hello beautiful, wonderful wall! Show me your hole. (*Snout makes a hole again with his thumbs and forefingers.*) Thank you, wonderful wall. But what can I see? Nothing! I cannot see Thisbe. You

are a terrible, horrible wall! I hate you.

Theseus: I think the wall should tell Pyramus how stupid he is! Bottom: No, My lord. He shouldn't. When I say 'I hate you,'

that is the cue for Thisbe to enter, and I will see her

through the hole. Watch.

Flute comes onto the stage.

Flute: Hello, sweet wall! You often hear me cry because you

stand between my lover and me.

Bottom: I hear a voice. I will go to the hole to see if I can see

my Thisbe's face. Thisbe?
