ness. This can also be used metaphorically. ♦ ħαμπερόs scarlet adj Something that is scarlet is bright red. ► She turned scarlet from embarrassment, once she realized what she had done. ♦ άħικοs, κόκκινοs της φωτιάς

deputy n The second most important person in an organization such as a business or government department. Sb's deputy often acts on their behalf when they are not there. ► France's minister for culture, and his deputy, Catherine Tasca, attended the meeting last night. ♦ αναπληρωτήs

association n An association is an official group of people who have the same job, aim, or interest. ► Research associations are often linked to a particular industry. ♦σύῆλογος, εταιρία

brawny adj Sb who is strong and has big muscles. ► Oscar turned out to be a brawny young man. ♦ μυώδης, ογκώδης premises n(pl) The premises of a business or an institution are all the buildings and land that it occupies in one place. ► There is a kitchen on the premises. ♦ όρια κτίσματος, ηειτουργικός χώρος

predominantly adv You use predominantly to indicate which feature or quality is most noticeable in a situation. ▶ Although it is predominantly a teenage problem, acne can

occur in early childhood. ♦ κυρίωs, βασικά

scrawl v To write sth in a careless and untidy way. ► He scrawled a hasty note to his wife. ♦ γράφω πρόχειρα και βιαστικά

modest adj If you say that sb is modest, you approve of them because they do not talk much about their abilities or achievements. ► Lord Carrington is modest about his achievements. ♦ σεμνόs, μετριόφρων

bespectacled adj Sb who is wearing glasses. ► *Mr Merrick was a slim, quiet, bespectacled man.* ♦ διοπτροφόροs, που φοράει γυαλιά

repel v If sth repels you, you find it horrible and disgusting. ► The violent excitement of the crowd frightened and repelled her. ♦ απωθώ

abusive adj Sb who is abusive behaves in a cruel and violent way towards other people. ► He became violent and abusive towards Ben's mother. ◆ βάναυσος, βίαιος lurk v If sb lurks somewhere, they wait there secretly so that they cannot be seen, usually because they intend to do sth bad. ► He thought he saw somebody lurking above the chamber during the address. ◆ καραδοκώ, εῆθοχεύω vengeance n the act of killing, injuring, or harming sb because they have harmed you. ► She cried aloud to the gods for vengeance for the loss of her daughter. ◆ εκδίκηση discipline v If sb is disciplined for sth that they have done wrong, they are punished for it. ► Her husband had at last taken a share in disciplining the boy. ◆ σωφρονίzω, επιβάῆθω πειθαρχία

harbour v If a person or country harbours sb who is wanted by the police, they let them stay in their house or country and offer them protection. ► Accusations of harbouring terrorist suspects were raised against the former Hungarian leadership. ♦ περιθάλπω, προσφέρω άσυλο

progeny n You can refer to a person's children or to an animal's young as their progeny. ► *Davis was never loquacious* on the subject of his progeny. ♦ απόγονοι

guilelessly adv If sb behaves guilelessly, they behave openly and truthfully and do not try to deceive people. ► Daphne spoke guilelessly and so Claire had no option but to believe her. ♦ άδολα, χωρίς πονηριά

testimony n If you say that one thing is testimony to another, you mean that it shows clearly that the second thing has a particular quality. ► Her living room is also her office, filled with desks, books, papers, a testimony to her dedication to her work. ♦ απόδειξη, μαρτυρία

obsession n If you say that sb has an obsession with a person or thing, you think they are spending too much time thinking about them. ► *She would try to forget her obsession with Christopher.* ♦ εμμονή

back number n A back number of a magazine or newspaper is one that was published some time ago and is not the most recent. ♦ παλιό τεύχος περιοδικού/εφημερίδας cognitive adj Cognitive means relating to the mental process involved in knowing, learning, and understanding things. ► As children grow older, their cognitive processes become sharper. ♦ νοητικός, γνωστικός

select adj If you describe sth as select, you mean it has many desirable features, but is available only to people who have a lot of money or who belong to a high social class. ► Christian Lacroix is throwing a very lavish and very select party. ♦ εκθεκτόs, επίθεκτοs

curriculum n A curriculum is all the different courses of study that are taught in a school, college, or university. ► Russian is the one compulsory foreign language on the school curriculum. ♦ σχοθικό πρόγραμμα, διδακτέα ύθη

bulk out phr.v If sb or sth bulks up or bulks out, they become bigger or heavier. ► *Use extra vegetables to bulk out the omelette.* ♦ προσδίδω όγκο

handicraft n Handicrafts are activities such as embroidery and pottery which involve making things with your hands in a skilful way. ► She taught herself handicrafts and cooking from books. ♦ χειροτεχνία

(academically) challenged adj If you say that sb is challenged in a particular way, you mean that they have a disability in that area. ▶ She ran off with an intellectually challenged ski instructor. ♦ που υστερεί σε ένα συγκεκριμένο τομέα **shine** v Sb who shines at a skill or activity does it extremely well. ► Did you shine at school? ♦ διαπρέπω, διακρίνομαι herbal adj made from or using herbs. ►My grandmother used to make herbal remedies for colds. ♦ φυτικόs, βοτανικόs **gleam n** If sb has a gleam in their eye, their eyes show a particular feeling. ▶ There was a gleam in her eye when she looked at me. ♦ στιγμιαία εκδήλωση, αναλαμπή, λάμψη **reminisce** v If you reminisce about sth from your past, you write or talk about it, often with pleasure. ▶ Ray and I ate our meal and reminisced about the trip. ♦ αναπολώ, νοσταλγώ **ferry v** If a vehicle ferries people or goods, it transports them, usually by means of regular journeys between the same two places. ► Every day, a plane arrives to ferry guests to and from Bird Island Lodge. ♦ μεταφέρω από και προs, πηγαινοφέρνω

offspring n You can refer to a person's children or to an animal's young as their offspring. ► Eleanor was now less anxious about her offspring than she had once been. ♦ απόγονος nuisance n If sb makes a nuisance of themselves, they behave in a way that annoys other people. ► He could be a bit of a nuisance when he was drunk. ♦ ενόχῆπση, μπεῆάς GCSE abbr GCSEs are British educational qualifications which schoolchildren take when they are fifteen or sixteen years old. GCSE is an abbreviation for `General Certificate of Secondary Education'. ► She quit school as soon as she had taken her GCSEs. ♦ αποῆυτήριο (αντίστοιχο του ῆυκείου) bracket n If you say that sb or sth is in a particular bracket, you mean that they come within a particular range, for example a range of incomes, ages, or prices. ► Do you fall outside that age bracket? ♦ ομάδα, κατηγορία

perspective n A particular perspective is a particular way of thinking about sth, especially one that is influenced by your beliefs or experiences. ► I would like to offer a historical perspective. ◆ προοπική, διάσταση

assembly n In a school, assembly is a gathering of all the teachers and pupils at the beginning of every school day. ▶ By 9, the juniors are in the hall for assembly. ♦ συγκέντρωση fervent adj sb that has or shows strong feelings about sth; very sincere and enthusiastic about it. ▶ She was a fervent admirer of Morisot's work. ♦ ένθερμος, ενθουσιώδης cheering adj something that brings people comfort or that makes them feel glad or happier. ▶ We received some cheering news. ♦ ενθαρρυντικός, που προκαθεί χαρά

a shade adv.phr If you say that sth is, for example, a shade unusual or a shade disappointing, you mean that it is slightly unusual or disappointing. ► The first two goals were a shade fortunate. ♦ λίγο, κάπως, ελαφρώς

reluctance n the act of showing unwillingness to do and hesitating before doing it, or doing it slowly and without enthusiasm. ► Ministers have shown extreme reluctance to explain their position to the media. ♦ απροθυμία

plain their position to the media. ♦ απροθυμία perfunctory adj an action done quickly and carelessly, showing a lack of interest in what you are doing. ► She gave the list only a perfunctory glance. ♦ τυπικόs, απρόθυμοs bewilderment n the feeling of being very confused and not being able to understand sth or decide what you should do. ► He shook his head in bewilderment. ♦ σαστιμάρα, μπέρδεμα undertake v When you undertake a task or job, you start doing it and accept responsibility for it. ► She undertook the arduous task of monitoring the elections. ♦ αναθαμβάνω

disillusionment n Disillusionment is the disappointment that you feel when you discover that sth is not as good as you had expected or thought. ▶ There is evidence of a general sense of disillusionment with the government. ♦ απογοήτευση prosaic adj Sth that is prosaic is dull and uninteresting. ▶ The truth is more prosaic. ♦κοινότυπος, ανιαρός expertise n Expertise is special skill or knowledge that is acquired by training, study, or practice. ▶ The problem is that most local authorities lack the expertise to deal sensibly in this market. ♦ αρτιότιτα γνώσεων, επιδεξιότητα

grit (one's teeth) v If you grit your teeth, you make up your mind to carry on even if the situation is very difficult. ► *There is going to be hardship, but we have to grit our teeth and get on with it.* ♦ σφίγγω τα δόντια, συνεχίζω υπομονετικά να κάνω κάτι δύσκολο

glimpse v If you glimpse sb or sth, you see them very briefly and not very well. ► She glimpsed a group of people standing on the bank of a river. ♦ ρίχνω μία φευγαθέα ματιά

ensure v To ensure sth, or to ensure that sth happens, means to make certain that it happens. ► Ensure that it is written into your contract. ♦ διασφαθίζω, βεβαιώνω up-to-date adj If sth is up-to-date, it is the newest thing of its kind. ► This production is up-to-date. ♦ ενημερωμένοs, σύγχρονοs

educationalist n sb who is specialised in the theories and methods of education. ♦ θεωρητικός εκπαιδευτικός correspondence n Correspondence is the act of writing letters to sb. ▶ His interest in writing came from a long correspondence with a close college friend. ♦ αθθηθογραφία on-going adj An on-going situation has been happening for quite a long time and seems likely to continue in the future. ▶ That research is on-going. ♦ τρέχων, τεκταινόμενος

clever, and imaginative way. ► They love her practical attitude to life, her zest and wit. ♦ πνεύμα, νοημοσύνη, ευστροφία multiple adj You use multiple to describe things that consist of many parts, involve many people, or have many uses. ► He died of multiple injuries. ♦ πολλαπλός catapult v If sth catapults you into a particular state or situation, or if you catapult there, you are suddenly and unexpectedly caused to be in that state or situation. ► Suddenly she was catapulted into his jet-set lifestyle. ♦ εκτοξεύω fiend n Fiend is a devil or an evil spirit. If you describe sb as a fiend, you mean that they are extremely wicked or cruel. ►

flatulence n Flatulence means pretentiousness, behaviour which shows that sb tries to seem important or significant, but you do not think that they are. ► He has a tendency towards flatulence. ♦ έπαρση, αθαzονεία

He was such a saint to his patients and such a fiend to his

children. ♦ δαίμοναs, τέραs (& μτφ)

wow v You say that sb wows people when they give an impressive performance and fill people with enthusiasm and admiration. ► Ben Tankard wowed the crowd with his jazz. ♦ ενθουσιάzω, ξεσηκώνω

rowdy adj When people are rowdy, they are noisy, rough, and likely to cause trouble. ► He has complained to the police about rowdy neighbours. ♦ θορυβώδης, φασαριόzικος traumatise v If sb is traumatised by an event or situation, it shocks or upsets them very much, and may cause them psychological damage. ► My wife was traumatised by this terrible experience. ♦ προκαθώ ψυχοθογικά τραύματα, επηρεάzω ψυχοθογικά

outing n An outing is a short enjoyable trip, usually with a group of people, away from your home, school, or place of work. ► One evening, she made a rare outing to the local discotheque. ♦ εκδρομή

trunk n The trunk of a car is a covered space at the back or front in which you put luggage or other things. (AM; in BRIT: boot) ♦ χώρος αποσκευών αυτοκινήτου, πορτ-παγκάz mayhem n You use mayhem to refer to a situation that is not controlled or ordered, when people are behaving in a disorganised, confused, and often violent way. ▶ Their arrival caused mayhem as crowds of refugees rushed towards them. ♦ xáos, χαμός

(at each others') throats expr

If two people or groups are at each other's throats, they are quarrelling or fighting violently with each other. ► The idea that Billy and I are at each other's throats couldn't be further from the truth. ♦ μαθώνω, καυγαδίzω άγρια comic strip n a series of drawings that tell a story, especially

in a newspaper or magazine. ♦ κόμικς, ιστορία σε σκίτσα walk-on n A walk-on part in a play or film is a very small part which usually does not involve any speaking. ▶ He and his family have walk-on parts in the latest film. ♦ μικρός ρόλος σε έργο (στο οποίο ο ηθοποιός απλώς εμφανίζεται χωρίς να έχει λόγια)

half pint n Half pint is used as slang to refer to a small or nondescript person. ♦ «μισή μερίδα», μικροκαμωμένος **boundary n** The boundary of an area of land is an imaginary line that separates it from other areas. ▶ Drug traffickers operate across national boundaries. ♦ όριο, σύνορο screenwriting n the process of writing screenplays. ▶ You can write a screenplay during our intensive screenwriting courses and workshops. • συγγραφή σεναρίων **one-liner n** a funny remark or a joke told in one sentence, for example in a play or comedy programme. ▶ *The book is* witty and peppered with good one-liners. ♦ (αστεία) ατάκα mental adj A mental act is one that involves only thinking and not physical action. ▶ Practise mental arithmetic when you go out shopping. ♦ νοερόs, νοητικόs make a mental note phr to make an effort to remember something. ▶ I made a mental note of her address. ♦ καταγράφω κάτι στη μνήμη μου, απομνημονεύω chase n Chase is the act of running after sb or following them quickly in order to catch or reach them. ▶ The car chase ended up with the arrest of the criminal. ♦ κυνηγητό **amorality n** Amorality is state of mind when one does not

seem to care whether what they do is right or wrong. ► Anita envied her sister's amorality and contempt for public opinion.

conscience is the part of your mind that

conscience n Your conscience is the part of your mind that tells you whether what you are doing is right or wrong. ► I could go away again with a clear conscience. ♦ συνείδηση

restless adj If sb is restless, they keep moving around because they find it difficult to keep still. ► My father seemed very restless and excited. ♦ αεικίνητος, νευρικός, ακούραστος innovative adj A person who introduces changes and new ideas. ► He was one of the most creative and innovative engineers of his generation. ♦ καινοτόμος, πρωτοπόρος hospitable adj sb who is friendly, generous, and welcoming

let alone conj Let alone is used after a statement, usually a negative one, to indicate that the statement is even more true of the person, thing, or situation that you are going to mention next. ► It is incredible that the 12-year-old managed to even reach the pedals, let alone drive the car. ♦ nóσο μάθλον...

intimidated adj Sb who feels intimidated feels frightened and lacks confidence because of the people they are with or the situation they are in. ► Women can come in here and not feel intimidated. ♦ φοβισμένοs, καταπτοημένοs

intrigued adj If you are intrigued by sth, especially sth strange, it interests you and you want to know more about it.
They are intrigued by her story. ♦ γοητευμένος από κάτι που μου έχει εξάψει το ενδιαφέρον

restrained adj Sb who is restrained is very calm and unemotional. ► In the circumstances he felt he'd been very restrained. ♦ επιφυλα-κτικόs, συγκρατημένοs

infuriated adj If sth or sb infuriates you or you are infuriated, they make you extremely angry. ► He knew me well enough to realize how infuriated such a conversation would make me. ♦ εξοργισμένοs, εξαγριωμένοs

futile adj If you say that sth is futile, you mean there is no point in doing it, usually because it has no chance of succeeding. ► He brought his arm up in a futile attempt to ward off the blow. ♦ μάταιος, ανώφελος

commendable adj If you describe sb's behaviour as commendable, you approve of it or are praising it. ► The tone of his speech was commendable. ♦ αξιέπαινος, ενδεδειγμένος fragile adj Sth that is easily broken, damaged or harmed. ► Be careful with that vase - it's very fragile. ♦ εύθραυστΟς rigorous adj If sb is rigorous in the way that they do sth, they are very careful and thorough. ► He is rigorous in his control of expenditure. ♦ αυστηρός, ενδεθεχής

relinquish v If you relinquish sth such as power or control, you give it up. ► He does not intend to relinquish power. ♦ εγκαταθείπω, παραχωρώ (αξίωμα, εξουσία)

entreat v If you entreat sb to do sth, you ask them very politely and seriously to do it. ► Trevor Steven entreated them to delay their departure. ♦ εκ∂ιπαρώ, ικετεύω

deter v To deter sb from doing sth means to make them not want to do it or continue doing it. ► *Jeremy was not deterred by this criticism.* ♦ αποτρέπω, αποθαρρύνω

detain v When the police, detain sb, they keep them in a place under their control. ► The act allows police to detain a suspect for up to 48 hours. ♦ θέτω υπό κράτηση

strangle v To strangle sb means to kill them by squeezing their throat tightly so that they cannot breathe. ► He tried to strangle a border policeman and steal his gun. ♦ στραγγαλίζω smother v To smother sb means to kill them by covering their face with sth so that they cannot breathe. ► A father was secretly filmed as he tried to smother his six-week-old son in hospital. ♦ προκαλώ ασφυξία

bulge v If sth such as a person's stomach bulges, it sticks out. ► *He bulges out of his black T-shirt*. ♦ φουσκώνω, διογκώνομαι

choke v When you choke or when sth chokes you, you cannot breathe properly or get enough air into your lungs. ► *The girl choked to death after breathing in smoke.* ♦ πνίγομαι, προκαλώ ή υφίσταμαι ασφυξία

contagious adj A disease that can be caught by touching people or things that are infected with it. ▶ He suffers from a highly contagious disease of the lungs. ♦ μεταδοτικόs

conspicuous adj If sb or sth is conspicuous, people can see or notice them very easily. ► *You may feel tearful in situations where you feel conspicuous*. ♦ περίοπτος, που τραβά τη προσοχή

abundant adj Sth that is present in large quantities. ▶ There is an abundant supply of cheap labour. ♦ άφθονος disputable adj Sth such as an issue is disputable when it is uncertain or liable to be argued about. ▶ His speech was full of disputable generalisations about people. ♦ αμφισβητήσιμος compromise v If you compromise, you accept that you will reduce your demands or change your opinion in order to reach an agreement with someone. ▶ We'll have to compromise otherwise no solution will be found. ♦ συμβιβάzομαι besiege v If soldiers besiege a place, they surround it and wait for the people in it to stop fighting or resisting. ▶ The Afghan air force was using helicopters to supply the besieged town. ♦ Ποβιορκώ

solicit v If sb such as a beggar solicits, they ask other people for money in an annoying and harassing way. ♦ zητιανεύω, εκθιπαρώ (φορτικά) να μου δοθεί κάτι

taunt v If sb taunts you, they say unkind or insulting things to you, especially about your weaknesses or failures. ► Other youths taunted him about his clothes. ♦ κοροϊδεύω, πειράzω occur v When sth occurs, it happens. ► If headaches only occur at night, lack of fresh air and oxygen is often the cause. ♦ συμβαίνω

recur v If sth recurs, it happens more than once. ► I have had a recurring nightmare since childhood. ♦ επαναλαμβά-νομαι, επανεμφανίzομαι

obscure v To make sth difficult to understand. ► *This issue has been obscured by recent events.* ♦ αποκρύπτω (& μτφ),

incur v If you incur sth unpleasant, it happens to you because of sth you have done. ► She falls in love and incurs the wrath of her father. ♦ υφίσταμαι, μου επιβάλλεται

turn out phr.v If a business or other organization turns out sth, it produces it. \blacktriangleright They have been turning out great blades for 400 years. \blacklozenge παράγω

turn up phr.v If you say that sb or sth turns up, you mean that they arrive, often unexpectedly or after you have been waiting a long time. ► This is similar to waiting for a bus that never turns up. ♦ εμφανίζομαι, παρουσιάζομαι

turn off phr.v If you turn off the road or path you are going along, you start going along a different road or path which leads away from it. ► *Turn off the motorway at the next exit.*

♦ βγαίνω απο έναν δρόμο προς κάποιον άλλο

turn down phr.v If you turn down a person or their request or offer, you refuse their request or offer. ▶ I thanked him for the offer but turned it down. ♦ απορρίπτω

distribute v If someone distributes sth, he gives it out to several people, or spreads or supplies it. ► The books will be distributed free to local schools. ♦ διανέμω

reflect v If sth reflects an attitude or situation, it shows that the attitude or situation exists or it shows what it is like. ► Concern at the economic situation was reflected in the government's budget. ◆ αντανακῆώ, αντικατοπτρίzω

gear v If sb or sth is geared to or towards a particular purpose, they are organized or designed in order to achieve that

purpose. \blacktriangleright Colleges are not always geared to the needs of mature students. \blacklozenge προσαρμόzω, -ομαι σε

come round phr.v

When sb who is unconscious comes around or comes round, they recover consciousness. ► When I came round I was on the kitchen floor. ♦ ανακτώ αισθήσειs, συνέρχομαι

come by phr.v

To come by sth means to obtain it or find it. ► How did you come by that cheque? ♦ βρίσκω, αποκτώ

appeal to \

If sb appeals to sb else, he makes a serious or formal request for money, information, or help. ► Church leaders have appealed to the government to halt the war. ♦ κάνω έκκθηση account for phr.v

To account for sth means to explain, justify, or cause sth. ► She wondered what could account for his sadness. ♦ δικαιοθογώ, αιτιοθογώ

abide by phr.v

To abide by an agreement, decision, or rule means to accept it. ► Competitors must abide by the judge's decision. ♦ τηρώ can't make head or tail of sth expr

If you can't make head or tail of something, you can't understand it at all. ► I can't make head or tail of these instructions on the packet. ♦ δεν καταθαβαίνω καθόθου
